A Sad Story

Last year the engine in my boat was running hot. I changed the water pump in the outdrive and assumed all was well. When I put the boat up, I used the same winterizing system I had used for several years. The system has a large container that is filled with antifreeze, and then attached to the engine water intake on the outdrive with a hose. The engine is run and the antifreeze is pumped throughout the engine block, etc. The process worked well in past years. Last year however, the antifreeze did not get throughout the engine resulting in a cracked engine block! Not a happy picture. I believe that the problem was that the water pump on the engine was not working and thus the antifreeze did not get to all parts of the engine. The moral of the story is that when winterizing a boat engine it is good to pull the drain plugs to insure that no water remains. I am thinking of retaking the Engine Maintenance course. On a brighter note, I was able to sell the boat with full disclosure. The new owner is very pleased with the boat and his "new" engine.

As Squadron Secretary, my summer was a quiet time and a nice break. Just wait 'til fall.

Sailing our Catalina 30 on Lake St. Clair proved interesting because we enjoyed an abundance of wind on every sail, much more so than in past seasons. This difference is not a function of any climate change, rather the particular days we selected for sailing. The Cat30 easily achieves 5 knots or more boat speed with a 10 knot wind. Maximum possible speed is about 7 knots (square root of water line length x 1.34). However, at winds of 14-15 knots, I generally would reef the jib first, then consider reefing the main. Our jib is mounted on a roller reefer around the forestay so reefing is easy while underway; release the sheet, ask the helmsman to sail on the main while rolling in perhaps a foot of jib, then trim the sheet again. A main reef is equally easy; release the main sheet while asking the helmsman to sail off the jib, then release the main halyard while bringing in the reefing line. The procedure can easily be reversed.

So constantly adjusting sail area based on wind speed is easy. The result is improved passenger comfort, a more relaxed job for the helmsman but actually little or no sacrifice in boat speed. In other words, make life easy for yourself. In fact, we can achieve almost the same boat speed while sailing jib-only in a 15 knot wind as compared to full sail. The only real difference is that the helmsman will work a bit harder on a reach since the main sail is not available to contribute to trim. Finally, I must confess that as we grow older, Jeannine and I are searching for the easiest way to sail with physical activity appropriate to our ages.

My final thought is advice from an experience this summer. My boat's air conditioning was not cooling adequately but was still working to some extent. Due to the hot summer the A/C technician was swamped and could not service it for 10 days. However I left the A/C running since it was still cooling. I have learned I should have immediately turned off the A/C, and so should you if you ever question your A/C's performance. The low cooling was due to low Freon and the Freon cools the compressor. My compressor overheated and seized up. As a result I now have a brand new compressor that was an unnecessary expense.
