


Roger is one of the very few who have traveled on a lake freighter, so I suggested that he talk to us about riding along on a lake carrier. This will be an opportunity to hear about life aboard the magnificent ships that we only see from a distance as we watch them silently glide past.

Many of us recognize Roger from another role. He was the art and music editor for the former Ann Arbor News, continues as a free-lance writer. He divides his time between Ann Arbor and Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan. When you visit the website www.boat.nerd.com and go to the news section, you will often find his photographs of shipping activity along the St. Mary's River. I hope that you will share my enthusiasm for this program.

In the previous Porthole, I said that our next America's Boating Course will start at Washtenaw Community College on Tuesday May 6th. When checking the USPS website, our AASPS course is one of 3 in Southeastern Michigan that will be presented in the Spring and includes the full 12 hour navigation program. This includes both traditional and electronic navigation. Students can receive both the USPS USCG-recognized certificate and the Michigan DNR boating safety certificate. These are two separate tests. 
Bob and I have both grown up in the midwest but this has been a winter to remember. We do not expect to hear any complaints when the hot summer days arrive!






D/9 Spring Conference – 2014

The trip to Holland to attend the District 9 Spring Conference was interesting. One would expect to see activity at the tulip farms; instead, ice pileup along the lake shore dominated the scene. This conference is the one at which the previous year accomplishments and activities are summarized, annual forecasts are presented and the incoming D/9 Bridge is inducted. H. Jay Stevens, SN from South Bend is the incoming commander. This year the D/9 Council meeting and the Conference were combined into two consecutive business meetings following a luncheon with about 110 people in attendance. Various awards (other than education accomplishments) were presented. Ann Arbor was in the mix. The National Communications Committee recognized distinctive performance of both the Porthole staff and the AASPS website. The other award is our twentieth consecutive Educational Fund Certificate of Merit. Ann Arbor was also recognized as one of the top five of twenty-two squadrons to increase membership during 2013. It was interesting that Kalamazoo, an interior squadron, won the award for greatest increase and retention of members. AASPS was not a top competitor for the total 1947 vessel safety checks performed by 168 examiners. As one would expect, the shoreline squadrons had the most inspections, and checkers with Grand Traverse Bay, amidst all their beautiful facilities, lead the group. Incidentally, 13% of inspected vessels failed.

The hospitality rooms, as usual provided an excellent opportunity to renew acquaintances and to socialize with members from all over the state; isn't this one of our basic precepts. Thirteen squadrons participated and six were active co-hosts. An objection at the meeting felt that more hospitality rooms would be set up if conferences were held in larger metropolitan areas (tabled).

Saturday morning seminars were mostly Bridge Officer meetings; also a GPS seminar and the ubiquitous membership seminar. But this membership seminar was different; a giant leap forward as they attempted to bring us into the world as it exists today. The D/9 Membership Committee is doing a great job and their enthusiasm is contagious. A few seminar highlights. Education is in transition. Printed media press releases are passé. We must focus on the various customers that we are trying to reach instead of developing programs that we like and presuming they will be acceptable. The quest for time out of the lives of all the various generations of people that we try to reach is highly competitive. We must define what we want to sell and adjust to multigenerational customer needs, both in content and pricing. In the field of public relations, media obviously is the prime channel of communications rather than press releases. The social media with universal coverage is the way to interact and to tout our product. The committee lauds the websites as a good basis but they must be kept current. We must promote USPS education and membership rather than deferring to other competing organizations; keep in mind that we are competing for customer's time and our programs are top priority. The D/9 Committee logic addresses the basic problems in their attempt to bring us up to today. Their hope is that their message resonates and we quit beating a dead horse.

All in all, if you were not there you missed an invigorating weekend.
